Celebrating Hispanic/Latine Americans



Helen Rodríguez Trías (July 7, 1929 – December 27, 2001) was a Puerto Rican American pediatrician, educator and women's rights activist. She was the first Latine president of the American Public Health Association (APHA), a founding member of the Women's Caucus of the APHA, and a recipient of the Presidential Citizens Medal.

She worked tirelessly throughout her career to expand the range of health care services available to women and children, especially those in underserved and marginalized communities in Puerto Rico and across the United States.

Evelyn Cisneros-Legate

(November 18, 1958-) is a Mexican American ballerina. She was the first Latine/Hispanic Prima ballerina. As a young child her mother had her take ballet classes in an attempt to overcome her shyness. She began to study ballet at eight years of age.

Cisneros joined the company of the San Francisco Ballet in 1977 where she danced for 23 years, performing nearly every starring role in the company's repertoire. In 1992 Cisneros was named in Hispanic Business's "100 Influentials". Cisneros was also recognized for her contribution to art in 1992 by Huntington Beach, California, where she had attended Marina High School, during the city's fifth annual arts awards program. She was recognized as an outstanding performing artist. In 2014 Cisneros was named by the Huffington Post as one of the "17 Ballet Icons Who Are Changing The Face Of Dance Today."

Isabel Allende(August 2, 1942-) is a novelist, feminist, and philanthropist. Allende is one of the world's most widely read authors, having sold over 75 million books.

Isabel, a Chilean born in Peru, achieved worldwide acclaim in 1982 with the publication of The House of the Spirits, her first novel, which began as a letter to her dying grandfather. She has written over twenty-five bestselling and critically acclaimed books since then, including Daughter of Fortune, Island Beneath the Sea, Paula, The Japanese Lover, A Long Petal of the Sea, and her most recent memoir, The Soul of a Woman. Allende's works, which have been translated into more than forty-two languages, entertain, and educate readers by interweaving imaginative stories with significant historical events.

She was inducted into the California Hall of Fame, received the PEN Center Lifetime Achievement Award, and the Anisfield-Wolf Lifetime Achievement Award, and has received fifteen honorary doctorates, including one from Harvard University.



President Barack Obama awarded Allende the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian honor, in 2014, and the National Book Foundation honored her with the Medal for Distinguished Contribution to American Letters in 2018.

What are we learning?

Inside the Music and Movement class we are exploring Tempo, which is the speed and pace of a song. We are learning how to listen to music and find the tempo or the beat of a song by clapping it out and counting to eight. We count to eight because in dance we count music in eights. After counting to eight, start all over at one for example: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, etc. If you see and/or hear your scholar clapping/counting out music it is because they are practicing this skill of finding the tempo and counting it. 


